From the Webmaster . . . Harvey Powers

We continue to grow the <u>Eller Family Association online database</u>. For that, we thank EFA members and at least one non-member.

Both Donn Koenig and Steve Eller have been providing print-outs of their respective research. Donn has been working on the descendants of George Eller, <u>Ir.</u> (from the Christian Eller line). And Steve is working on an update of the <u>John Jacob Eller book</u> and has mailed me information that both he and Jerry Taylor have

uncovered. And I have added the additional names found in David Eller's large 2012 book on George Michael Eller. One person found our information online and contacted me to update her family

information.

The result is that we're now up to nearly 72,000 names in the database. There are some duplications as the information on the major lines are kept in separate files but, in some cases, overlap resulting in the same individual showing up twice.

We have 23,000 names in the Christian database. I have several hundred more names from Donn



Koenig that I haven't added yet. We have 18,300 names in the Jacob database and I still have some to add. I also anticipate more when the book is finished.

The process of adding people does take time. I add each individual one at a time. I also have been trying to check many of the new additions against the *Ancestry* and the *Find-A-Grave* databases, so that I can add photos and obituaries when I can find them.

In addition to adding the individual names to the database, I have been placing online the Modified Registers that Donn and Steve sent. They are in the <u>"Research Documents" section</u> of the website. We now have some 233 documents going back to research from Gerald Eller.

Clearly people are using our website. In October, we had 2,668 visits to the website. These folks looked at a total of 31,762 pages. And October wasn't a particularly busy month. In July, visitors looked at 58,951 pages.

We make a determined effort (not always successful) to keep information hidden on anyone in the database who's still alive. But EFA members can see that data along with the most recent issues of the *Chronicles* using their login and password. If you never got one (or forgot yours) you can <u>contact me</u> and I'll see that you get access.

Board/Directors Meeting Minutes

The October 24, 2021 Board/Directors meeting (by phone) was called to order at 9:20pm EDT. Present on the call were Lauren Liggett, Dan Liggett, Harvey Powers, Anna Bliss, Emily Cook and Corrine Casper. Ed Eller, Steve Eller, Jerry Kendall and David Eller were unable to attend.

Harvey Powers reported on his progress concerning the next EFA Conference in 2023 in Indiana. He has contacted several Methodist churches known to have been ministered by Eller descendants, but no additional information was available. He has been unable to connect with any local Eller descendants so far. Harvey has contacted the local Historical Society and they are willing to present something at the conference and they offered to open their facilities to the conference attendees regardless of their normal days/hours of operation. The nearby Eller Cemetery is located on the local airport property, but they will work with us to make access to the cemetery available during the conference. Several local accommodations are available and willing to work with us.

Harvey went on to report on the EFA website. We now have 71,836 names in the EFA database: 22,965 from the Christian line; 18,368 from the Jacob line and 13,674 from the George Michael line. We've added more than 3,000 names since the conference in Haysville. Steve Eller has been providing Harvey with a large number of Jacob-line names including some print-outs from Jerry Taylor. Included are James Eller, John Gordon Eller, James Kimsey Eller and Malinda Eller. Harvey still has several hundred he has not gotten to.

Donn Koenig has provided the names of hundreds of Christian Eller descendants. Harvey has added fewer than half the names. They are from the George Eller, Jr. line (John, Susan, Wilkerson, George Washington, Harrison, Henry and Betty). He continues to working on them.

For both projects, Harvey has been able to add a number of photographs that were on either Find-A-Grave or Ancestry. To further his efforts, he was wondering if the EFA would agree to pay for a 6-month subscription (\$60) to Newspapers.com so he would have better access to Obituaries and other information related to the research he is adding to the website. His request was approved and he will proceed with the subscription.

As treasurer, Lauren reported that she discovered that the EFA unknowingly lost their non-profit status about 10 years ago due to lack of reporting. Evidently, once the non-profit status was approved, the entity must report income annually. This is not the same as a tax return and could have been done with a postcard or online. However, the need to report was not passed on to the next Treasurer since 2007 or 2009 and so the reporting stopped. Once 3 years had passed without reporting, our non-profit status was revoked. A couple of years after that, the appeal process was no longer available. So, our only recourse is to reapply for non-profit status. The first form in the process has been submitted.

With no further business to conduct the meeting was adjourned at 9:47pm EDT.

Before everyone hung up, Emily asked about some direction in looking up the name Lewis Monroe Eller. Harvey was able to quickly find in Ancestry and on Find A Grave that he lived 1865-1929 and that it looks like his father was John H. Eller, grandfather John Charles Eller, then John Melchior Eller and then Melchior Eller.

A Tribute to Betty Eller

When asked to write a memorial tribute for Betty Eller for the Eller Chronicles, two words came to mind...Family and Love. I'm sure all of you have many memories of Betty from Eller



Reunions, Family gatherings, and visits to Dalton. There was never a time when she was not loving and caring to everyone; whether it be holding a baby, cooking a delicious meal, or simply asking about how you are doing and to make sure you were comfortable.



I remember when I first met Betty when I began dating Tammy, I thought to myself "what a kind and gracious woman Betty is", and she did not change any in the following 30 years that I knew her. I know myself, as well as my other in-laws have always felt like her children and were welcomed graciously into her loving arms. When our girls were babies and toddlers, she would gravitate to them and love on and nurture them from the time she arrived until the time she left. As they aged, she never missed a ballet performance, choir concert, theatrical production, or band performance. She also traveled to California numerous times for important events for her long-distance grandchildren. She traveled with Ed, the love of her life, to many family events and Eller Conferences and would come back with stories of how much fun she had had seeing everyone and playing Farkle with her family.





My niece, Catri Barba, gave the following Eulogy at her grandmother's funeral that simply touched my heart and I feel like summed up her life. I thought these words were perfect and said exactly what I was thinking when asked to write about Betty.

"Some believe that things in life are left up to destiny; others believe in chance. Grandpa Ed would say Lady Luck smiled upon him the day that Betty stepped off her bus. From that chance meeting 63 years ago love bloomed. Three generations followed— an ever-expanding family tree of 3 children, 7 grandchildren, and 3 great-grandchildren.

In another chance encounter, as I sifted through a stack of papers in grandma's kitchen, I came across a hand-written note in her handwriting. On this small piece of paper were 6 little principles to live by — which I assume to be notes from a sermon. As I ready these short proverbs, I was overwhelmed by the fact that they each represented my grandmother to a T. I'd like to share them with you.

- 1. Choose to be happy
- 2. Embrace Possibilities
- 3. Make the changes that make a difference
- 4. Pray hard
- 5. Celebrate the love of God
- 6. Live each day to the fullest

Betty was so good at sharing her wisdom through her generosity, kindness, and love. And after reading this, I was compelled to look for a verse to pair with it. I grabbed grandpa's bible and turned to the page that a red and white striped ribbon had marked. I immediately recognized the red underlined words of Proverbs 3:5-6;

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart; lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways, submit to him, and he will make your paths straight."

By chance though, I kept reading the chapter and came across verses 17-18;

"Her ways are ways of pleasantness, and all her paths are peace. She is a tree of life to them that lay hold upon her; and happy is everyone that retaineth her."

Doesn't that sound like Betty?

Betty Eller was an ever-flowing fountain of love. She lived every day loving her family, friends, neighbors and her Lord. Betty was the epitome of a good Christian woman who graced our lives with genuine joy. Whether it was destiny or chance, I am so glad it all happened. It has been a privileged to be love by her and to see how many near and far have been affected by her grace.

Catri Grisso Barba."

In closing, it's quite ironic that I'm composing this memoriam to Betty on All Saints Day, a Christian solemnity celebrated in honor of all the saints of the church. Today, Betty's name was read and a candle was lit in her memory. So many memories have crossed my mind today, and I know that her love and compassion will live on through her children, grand-children and great grandchildren.






Thank You Ed Eller



New Fundraiser For Old Smyrna Cemetery Access

Steve Eller, President of the Eller Family Association, has received a land use permit form from the US Forest Service. This land use permit will allow his group of dedicated workers to finally develop a usable road and allow people to drive right up to the cemetery. The road has been torn up by off road vehicles, rain and other factors. Steve feels like this may be the last chance to save this road which allows workers to maintain Old Smyrna Cemetery.



There are about 45 graves at this location. Out of the eleven known to be buried there, nine are Eller/Garrett/Nicholson/Rogers Descendants. The Eller Family Association, Towns County

Historical Society and concerned citizens need your help. An engineer and other citizens have donated their time and expertise to this project. However, they are in need of donations for materials. A load of material (rocks, gravel and crusher run) will cost \$150 to deliver. They are asking for donations for the cost of a load of materials, at least. Roanoke Eller Connection Confirmed

In the May issue of the Eller Chronicles, we expressed an interest in locating a male descendant of Jacob Eller of what has come to be known as the Roanoke Ellers:

Jacob Eller line (Roanoke Ellers) DNA

We are looking for a male descendant of Jacob Eller of the Roanoke Ellers who is willing to submit his DNA for the Eller Family Project at Family Tree DNA. The EFA will pay for the DNA kit and for the DNA test.

Soon afterward, we got a call from Howard Eller of Kokomo, IN whose ancestry goes back to the Roanoke Ellers (his 4th great grandfather was Jacob Eller, husband of Magdalena). Howard volunteered to do the DNA test as requested. We sent him a DNA kit to send on to Family Tree DNA for Y-DNA testing and comparisons to the Eller Family Project at Family Tree DNA.

The results are in. Howard and presumably all the descendants of the Jacob Eller line of Roanoke, VA match up with other DNA results from the George Michael Eller line. The exact relationship is yet to be determined, but they are definitely part of the George Michael Eller line.

Want to learn more abou the Roanoke Ellers? Read a series of articles on the Roanoke Ellers beginning with the May 1988 Eller Chronicles.

And there is more in the <u>May 1993 Chronicles</u> as well. In that article, a Howard Eller is mentioned in the vicinity of the Howard Eller who volunteered his DNA. I suspect the Howard in the article may have been Howard the DNA volunteer's father, but I am not sure.

The EFA website database has a page for <u>Jacob Eller (Roanoke)</u>. On that page are links to 5 separate articles (under EFA Research) about Jacob Eller's descendants and of his probable connection to George Michael Eller (which until now was unproven).

Eller Descendant Remembered

I recently had lunch with Ed Eller and the wife of James Clifton Eller, Pauline (Polly). Clif was from Robbinsville, North Carolina and was buried at the Metz Cemetery. Take the time to read the obituary excerpt below for Clif. He and his family were early settlers (before statehood) in Alaska and started power/phone companies there.

James Clifton Eller, 87, passed away peacefully at his home in Wasilla, Alaska, on March 9, 2017. Clif was born on July 23, 1929, in Robbinsville, N.C., the eldest son of Hobart Hobson and Fannie Elizabeth (Jones) Eller. He joined the U.S. Army shortly after high school and served for three years in Germany as a communications technician. After his time in the service, Clif worked and attended college in Fresno, Calif., until he was offered a job in Alaska with ITT, which paid more than his professors were making. Being an enterprising young man, he decided to take the job and move north to work on the Distant Early Warning (DEW Line) system being set up during the Cold War. He worked mainly in the Yukon River village

of Tanana, Alaska, where he met Paula E. Rothbauer, an adventurous young nurse from Calgary, Alberta, who would become his wife on Dec. 31, 1959.

Clif and Paula raised their four children in Tanana. They worked hard to improve life for their family and the community. They created Yukon Telephone Co. in 1960, which brought local phone service to the village for the first time. Six years later Clif purchased the town's power plant and created Tanana Power Co. The telephone company expanded to include the communities of Ruby and Whittier, Alaska, in the 1980s. With very little capital or equipment and even less experience, he and Paula became communications pioneers bringing modern technology to rural Alaska.



Clif loved being a pilot, and owned several airplanes throughout his adult life. He was an avid reader, enjoyed playing guitar and listening to bluegrass music. He also enjoyed games and passed many hours playing chess and cribbage with his family. Although he lived in Alaska for many years, the family farm in Atoah in the hills of North Carolina remained dear to his heart. He loved going "home" twice a year. He was an easy-going man, preferred to listen rather than speak and he will be remembered fondly and missed by many.

Sheriff Killed in Gunbattle

HIAWASSEE, Ga. — Towns County Sheriff Jay Chastain was shot and killed early Sunday as he stopped a car for a traffic violation just east of this town near the North Carolina-Georgia border, police said.

However, Chastain, 46, managed to shoot back at his assailant before he died, authorities added.

The Georgia Bureau of Investigation said Roy Struben Lockaby, 42, of Hiawassee was killed in the exchange of gunfire with officers arriving at the scene.

GBI agent R. C. McCracken said the shooting occurred when Chastain and Deputy Sheriff Rudy Eller stopped a car two miles east of here at the intersection of U.S. 76 and Georgia 288 for a traffic violation.

McCracken said the driver of the car, identified as Ernest Harold Hollifield, 36, of Dahlonega, was arrested on a charge of driving under the influence of alcohol.

Later in the day, police obtained warrants charging Hollifield with one count of murder and two counts of burglary.

The agent said Eller was escorting Hollifield to the patrol car when Lockaby, a passenger in the car, fired three shots, striking Chastain once in the chest.

The sheriff was dead on arrival at Towns County Hospital, McCracken said.

Eller Descendant Killed in D-Day Invasion

PFC Harry DeWitt of Deleware County, Indiana, was killed in the D-Day invasion in Normandy, France. He was in the 29th Infantry Division, 116th Infantry Regiment, Company B.

He was a descendant of Christian Eller/Ohler through his son George and George's Grand-daughter Susan Elizabeth "Betsy" Eller. His full genealogy can be found at http://www.ellerfamilyassociation.com/getperson.php? personID=I21488&tree=christian2

The first boats from his company hit the beach as part of a second wave on June 7th, the day after D-Day. There are records which say he died on June 7th and other records which say he died on June 17th, after his unit pushed inland near Vierville.

Unit records say the sea had been so rough throughout the journey that all hands had to bail with their helmets in order to keep the boats afloat. They were little affected by the enemy fire until the ramps were dropped; then

automatic fire from

both flanks broke around the B-Company boat exits. The men jumped into neck-high water and started ashore. As it happened, the boat had come into the coast directly confronting a small cover. The beach was strewn with heavy boulders and could be traversed only with extreme difficulty.

They joined a group of Rangers at the cove and fought with them all day long helping them destroy the German positions around the fortified house and in the emplacements at the top of the cliff. There were 28 of them in all. After mopping-up the German trenches, they stayed at the second hedgerow beyond the cliff when they were ordered to rejoin the Battalion in its bivouac near Vierville.

Eller Descendant Contributes

While updating the John Jacob Eller Book, I ran across another Eller Descendant that I thought made some outstanding contributions to the world we live in. <u>JoGayle Dillon Howard</u> goes back to John Jacob Eller Jr. through his son Adam (Adam was Sukey's brother). Born and raised in Dallas, but destined as a gift to the world, Dr. JoGayle Dillon Howard dedicated her life and work to endangered species. As soon as she arrived at the Smithsonian's National Zoological Park in 1980, a freshly graduated veterinarian from Texas A&M University, JoGayle's intense research on animal reproduction and her pioneering new techniques earned her the title of "Sperm Queen," a nickname she relished. Completing her doctorate at the University of Maryland in 1989, the National Institutes of Health awarded her the prestigious Special Emphasis Research Career Award Fellowship that helped support her work. Throughout her career, she received numerous awards and international acclaim for her innovative research.


In 2010, the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service bestowed upon her the prestigious award of "Recovery Champion" for her work with endangered species.



JoGayle played a leadership role in understanding the reproductive biology of the world's beloved giant panda. She was a key scientist on a multi-institutional team that conducted a biomedical survey of giant pandas in China from 1998 through 2000. Her studies, along with Chinese and American colleagues, helped identify the causes of poor reproduction in giant pandas living in breeding centers and zoos, which then helped contribute to a panda population explosion over the past decade. With Chinese colleagues, she developed new protocols for sperm cryopreservation and artificial insemination. It was JoGayle who artificially inseminated the National Zoo's female panda, Mei Xiang, and produced the first surviving cub, Tai Shan, in 2005. But of the many species she studied, JoGayle was most interested in the secretive and beautiful clouded leopard of Southeast Asia. When the breeding program in North American zoos foundered, she established a research program in the range country of Thailand. She discovered the key to reproductive success was improved husbandry (including pairing animals at a young age), ensuring better nutrition, and providing more spacious enclosures. More than 50 cubs resulted, and JoGayle raised funds for the first-ever field studies of this elusive species.

Eller Descendant Directed the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory

C. Bruce Tarter, a theoretical physicist, was the director of the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory for eight years starting in 1994. He established the Laboratory's post-Cold-war program to ensure the safety of the American nuclear stockpile and the development of the U.S. supercomputer.

He graduated from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) and received his PhD from Cornell University.

During the last years of his tenure as Director he experienced the challenges of the Chinese espionage program, the creation of the National Nuclear Security Administration a new government agency to oversee the Laboratory's work, and the beginning of the Homeland Security Department.

INTRODUCTION

North Georgia runs from the Tallulah Gorge and Chattooga River country on the South Carolina border across the Blue Ridge Mountains south of the North Carolina line, over to the long ridges of Lookout Mountain angling up toward Tennessee, then down through the piney woods and textile mill towns of the Piedmont into the northern edge of the old cotton belt plantation country extending east and west from Atlanta. In this area rural people of English and African descent and mountain folk of Scotch-Irish and German stock have nurtured and developed a variety of folk music styles, emblematic of Southern traditions and well-springs of later American musical forms. Some, like the spirited Piedmont fiddle band music and the raggy Piedmont blues, are distinctive styles that became popular beyond the region through early "hillbilly" and "race" commercial records in the twenties and thirties. Other traditions, like unaccompanied mountain ballad singing, banjo breakdowns and songs, black early spirituals and their secular counterparts in frolic and work songs, are more widespread through the South, though Georgians give them a distinctive flavor.

We have been seeking out and recording performers of these older styles since 1977 and have found singers and musicians with retentive memories and authentic and authoritative performing styles. They learned their music at a time when family, church, and neighborhood were the chief sources of musical expression and entertainment, just before or during the time when radio and recordings were beginning to draw upon, proliferate, and transform these local traditions. Of the many hundreds of musical examples we recorded, over eighty were published in our book Folk Visions and Voices: Traditional Music and Song in North Georgia (field col-

lecting, text, drawings and paintings by Art Rosenbaum; photographs by Margo Newmark Rosenbaum; musical transcriptions by Bela Foltin, Jr.; foreword by Pete Seeger. Athens: University of Georgia Press, 1983.) This work emphasizes the lives and experiences of the most interesting informants we recorded and interviewed and presents drawings, paintings, and photographs from the exhibition which was the initial mode of presenting the material.

The present two-volume LP anthology draws all its material from the book. In most cases the example on the record was also the source for the text and tune transcription in the book, although in some cases an alternate take was used; and in a few instances pieces were re-recorded expressly for this record when a better performance was desired. The recordings were made on a Pioneer RT-1050 stereo deck in homes and churches across north Georgia, and the informality of the situations, heard at times through laughter, incidental comments, background noises, should contribute to rather than detract from the spirit and persuasiveness of the performances. These records can serve as companions to the book Folk Visions and Voices, along with our other Folkways LP, Down Yonder -- Old Time String Band Music from Georgia, with Gordon Tanner, Smoky Joe Miller, and Uncle John Patterson (FTS 31089), which includes much of the musical material from the chapter on Gordon Tanner and his family and friends who have carried on the tradition of Gordon's father, Gid, and his famous Skillet Lickers string band.

Through their long history Afro-American and Anglo-American, and sacred and secular folk music traditions have coexisted and at times influenced each other in north Georgia. In this spirit we have paired the older white mountain ballad and lyric song traditions with black religious singing on Volume I; and black "worldly" music like blues, work songs, and pre-blues frolic tunes with white banjo tunes and string band music on Volume II. These two discs, along with Down Yonder, will present the powerful and varied folk music of north Georgia as it has been carried into the last decades of the twentieth century. Our appreciation goes to the talented and dedicated folk musicians of the area who welcomed us into their homes, churches, and social gatherings, and who shared with

us, and now with you, the listener, these treasured traditions.





- 5. Thou shalt NOT use any middle names on any legal documents or census reports, and only where necessary, you may use only initials on legal documents.
- 6. Thou shalt learn to sign all documents illegibly so that your surname can be spelled, or misspelled, in various ways: Loftin, Lofton, Loften, Loften, Lipton.
- 7. Thou shalt, after no more then 3 generations, make sure that all family records are lost, misplaced, burned in a court house fire, or buried so that NO future trace of them can be found.
- 9. Thou shalt propagate misleading legends, rumors, & vague innuendo regarding your place of origination.
 - a. You may have come from: England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, Germany....or Italy.
 - b. You may have American Indian or Black Dutch ancestry.
 - c. You may have descended from one of three brothers that came over from England
 - d. Thou shalt leave NO cemetery records, or headstones with legible names.
- 10. Thou shalt leave NO family Bible with records of birth, marriages or deaths.
- 11. Thou shalt ALWAYS flip thy name around. If born James Franklin, thou must make all the rest of thy records in the names of James, Jim, Franklin, Frank, JF.
- 12. Thou must also flip thy parent's names when making reference to them, although "Unknown" or a blank line is an acceptable alternative.
- 13. Thou shalt name at least 5 generations of males, and dozens of their cousins with identical names in order to totally confuse researchers. (Example: William Alexander Loftin had a sister named Mary Frances Loftin. He also named his first daughter Mary Frances Loftin. Both of these women then married men with the last name of Drum)





James Hook printed the first work on the Eller genealogy in 1925 titled: James Hook and Virginia Eller. He printed the second edition on the Eller family after thirty-two years titled: George Michael Eller and Descendants of His in America. However, only a few copies of Hook's first two published works are still in existence.

According to tradition, the Eller ancestors were from the Palatinate of Germany, where Eller is the name of at least five villages. Eller means "dweller near the elder trees." The name was confirmed as being of German origin by its coat of arms, which was found in Reirstap's Armorial General P1 CCLXIII as well as by the will of George Michael Eller, written in German (1778) and recorded in Frederick County, Maryland. Strong evidence showing George Michael to the son of Georg Eller of Kaltenbrunn, Untermerzbach, Bavaria exists, showing George as the second son of the union of Georg and Margaretha Huels Eller.

Margaretha Eleonor Sallén began researching the Eller lineage in 1966 until her death in 1973 when it continued with David until completed and printed in late 2012. Each chapter focuses on nine generations of these figureheads: George Michael Eller, James Scott, John Martin, Sr., William Gallaway, Robert Harper, Sr., William Smith Bryan, and John R. Stewart.
